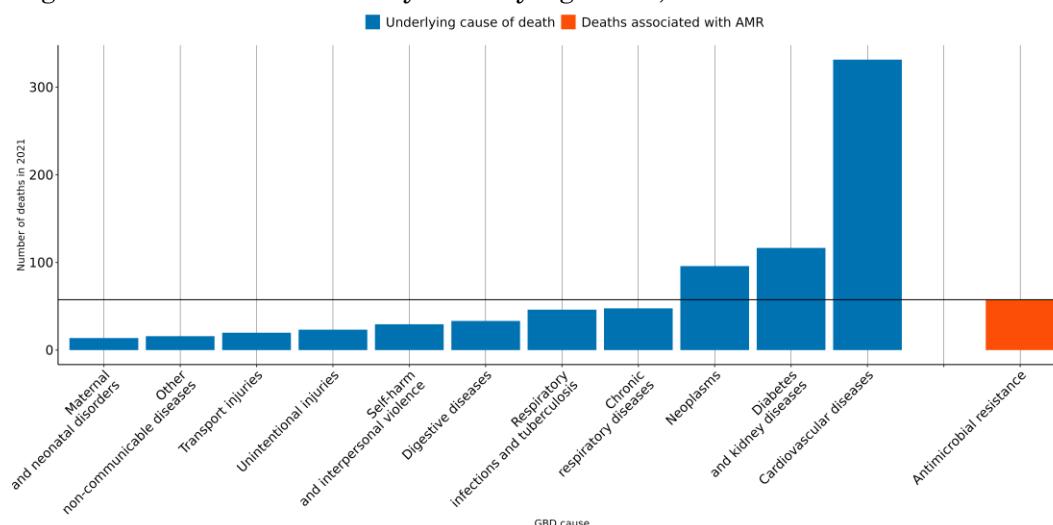


# The burden of antimicrobial resistance (AMR) in Micronesia (Federated States of)

## Executive summary

- Antimicrobial Resistance (AMR) is a major global health threat, over **20 lives** have been lost each year since 1990 in Micronesia (Federated States of) due to AMR.
- In 2021, there were an estimated **14 UI (10-18)** deaths attributable to AMR and **58 UI (42-72)** deaths associated with AMR in this location.
- The largest number of deaths associated with AMR in 2021 occurred among those aged **50 to 69** in the country.
- Among the most deadly pathogen-drug combinations in 2021 were *Acinetobacter baumannii* resistant to carbapenems, *Acinetobacter baumannii* resistant to fluoroquinolones and *Streptococcus pneumoniae* resistant to carbapenems.

Figure 1 Number of deaths by underlying cause, and those associated with AMR in 2021



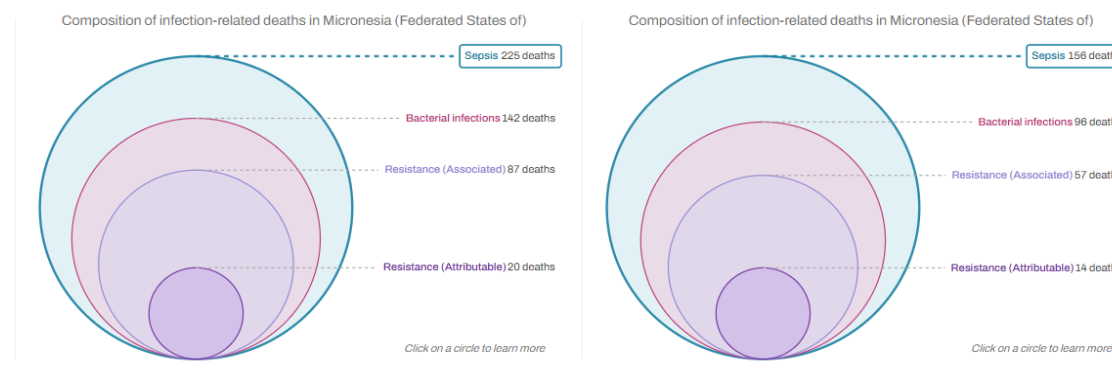
- In 2021, the number of deaths associated with AMR (orange bar in *figure 2*) were high compared to the most relevant underlying causes of death (depicted in blue) in the country. AMR associated deaths occur within multiple Global Burden of Disease (GBD) causes of death and AMR is not an underlying cause of death by itself.
- At the [2024 United Nations General Assembly high level meeting on antimicrobial resistance](#), country members agreed to aim for a **10% reduction** compared to 2019 baseline (**from 4.95 to 4.45 million**) in the global number of deaths associated with AMR by 2030. But [our forecast](#) indicates that in absence of concerted action, deaths associated with AMR could reach **5.5 million** (UI 4.8 - 6.2) if current trends continue. For Micronesia, a 10% reduction means to decrease the number of deaths associated with AMR to **52**, but currently the trend for this country could reach up to **65 UI [46-91]** AMR-associated deaths in 2030.

## AMR in Micronesia (Federated States of)

- Globally, 4.71 (95% Uncertainty Interval (UI) 4.2-5.2) million deaths were associated with bacterial drug-resistant infections in 2021.
- And 1.14 (UI 1 - 1.3) million deaths were attributable to bacterial drug-resistant infection in the same year.
- *39 (UI 33 - 46) million deaths* directly attributable to bacterial AMR are projected to occur between 2025-2050 unless concerted action is taken. This equates to three deaths every minute.

- In **Micronesia (Federated States of)** in 2021, there were an estimated **14 UI (10-18)** deaths attributable to AMR and **58 UI (42-72)** deaths associated with AMR. Here “*attributable deaths*” are considered to be those that would have been prevented had the drug-resistant bacteria causing the infections not been drug-resistant. “*Associated deaths*” are considered to be those that would not have occurred had the infections been prevented entirely.
- Across 204 countries, **Micronesia (Federated States of)** has the **58th highest** age-standardized mortality rate associated with AMR in 2021.
- *Table 1* shows the bacteria which caused most deaths in 2021 (↑ indicates an increasing estimated annual rate between 1990-2021, ↓ indicates a decreasing annual trend), and *table 2* shows the pathogen-drug combinations which caused most deaths in 2021.

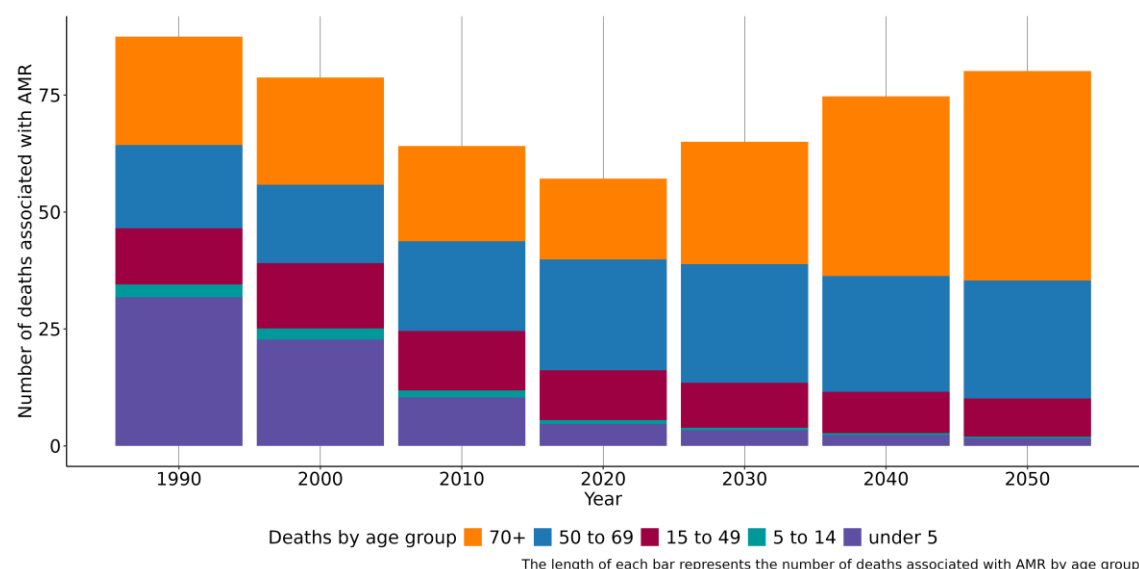

- Independently of antimicrobial resistance, the infectious syndromes accounting for the most deaths in 2021 were as follows (estimated thousands of deaths in parenthesis) lower respiratory infection (excl. COVID) (55 UI (43-68)), bloodstream infections (43 UI (34-53)), tuberculosis (12 UI (8-16)), diarrhea (9 UI (5-13)) and peritoneal and intra-abdominal infections (8 UI (6-10)).

- In Micronesia (Federated States of), people aged under 5 experienced the largest number of deaths associated with AMR in 1990 but this changed by 2021 as the largest number of deaths occurred among the 50 to 69. This indicates that prevention of infections among the under 5 has contributed to the reduction in the number of AMR associated deaths. In 2021, the number of deaths associated with AMR among the 50 to 69 was 24 UI (17-31), whereas the mortality rate per 100,000 was 703 UI (543-863).

### Data sources for Micronesia (Federated States of)

In total, 520 million individual records or isolates covering 19,513 study-location-years were used as input data to our estimation process. The subset of input data for this country is shown below.
